In the 13th century the Crusaders stormed through the region, and between 1259 and 1306 the pope’s private army devastated Mt. Athos several times. Monks of Zographou and Vatopedi monasteries and the Protaton were martyred for the Orthodox Faith, and the monks of the Iveron Monastery eventually met the same fate.

In the early Christian Church, a martyr was a person put to death for refusing to renounce the Christian faith. The word martyr means “witness,” and martyrs bore their sufferings, even to death, as Christ’s witnesses. During the eleventh and twelfth centuries, this concept was considerably developed and extended, and the crusades played a significant part in this process.

Martyrdom, Christian - The Crusades

Imagine this: the Ukrainian Catholic Church had 2,772 parishes, 8 bishops, 4,119 churches and chapels, 142 monasteries and convents, 2,628 priests, 164 monks, 773 nuns and 4 million laypeople. By the end of the largest suppression of believers in world history, the entire apparatus was reduced to: zero.

The only martyrs of the Crusades who could possibly be considered as such were those who were killed by the original Muslim invasion of the Byzantine empire before the official start of the Crusades and who were in no way part of an armed or political resistance to the army.

Christian missionaries arrived with Francis Xavier and the Jesuits in the 1540s and briefly flourished, with over 100,000 converts, including many daimyōs in Kyushu. It soon met resistance from the highest office holders of Japan. Emperor Ogimachi issued edicts to ban Catholicism in 1565 and 1568, but to little effect. Beginning in 1587 with imperial regent Toyotomi Hideyoshi's ban on Jesuit missionaries, Christianity was repressed as a threat to national unity. After the Tokugawa shogunate ...

Many believers were, in the words of Foxe’s Book of Martyrs, “bound to relinquish not only goods and children, but life itself, for the glory of their Redeemer.” A vast host were swept away in the wars that raged across Europe: the German Peasants’ War (1524–25), the Battle of Kappel (1531), the Schmalkaldic War (1546–47), the Huguenot repression (1562–98), the Eighty Years’ War (1568–1648), the Thirty Years’ War (1618–48), and the Wars of the Three Kingdoms (1639–51).

A History of Persecution by George Grant

Some scholars consider the massacres to be the earliest known incident of antisemitism. Prominent leaders of crusaders involved in the massacres included Peter the Hermit and especially Count Emicho. As part of this

persecution, the destruction of Jewish communities in Speyer, Worms and Mainz was noted as the "Hurban Shum" (Destruction of Shum).
