OSHA's regulation, "Access to Employee Exposure and Medical Records" (29 CFR 1910.1020), requires the retention of occupational medical records for 30 years after termination of a worker for the purpose of providing access to the records for employees and their representatives after a worker has left employment.

OSHA recognizes this concern with paragraphs (d) (2) (v) and (d) (2) (vi) of the standard, stating

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employees must wash their hands after the removal of gloves and other personal protective equipment. Employees must also wash their hands or skin following contact with blood or other potentially infectious materials.
